Innovating: today's challenge for us all for the Alps of tomorrow

The focus at AlpWeek 2008 is on innovation as the motor for change which needs to be triggered by the people living in the Alps – in the face of climate change especially – and also on the innovations that are necessary if we are to find sustainable solutions to the problems of urbanisation, the decline of agriculture, the increasing frequency of natural hazards, and the impacts of mass tourism, road transport, etc.

AlpWeek will be held on 11 to 14 June 2008 in L'Argentière-la-Bessée, France. Representatives of the scientific community, local authorities, NGOs and protected areas, as well as mountain sports enthusiasts and interested individuals from the eight countries of the Alps will come together to discuss and analyse ways of innovating and to study the best practices that have already been established in many places in the Alps.

The conference will be organised around five main themes and will present numerous examples of innovation and potential solutions to the problems confronting mountain populations today.

In this context, innovation cannot simply be about technology and technical solutions. What is important is change at the level of our thinking and the need to think things through to their logical conclusions, as the following two examples illustrate:

- There is a tendency today to give priority to all forms of renewable energy. But it is often forgotten that all the renewable energy sources combined will never be able to meet our total energy requirements. That means we must first find ways of saving energy before we address the problem of energy production. In other words, before solar panels are installed on the roof, the building must be properly insulated!
- Institutional investors normally concentrate on the infrastructure, e.g. roads and railways. But in terms of sustainability it would be more meaningful to seek to optimise the use of the existing infrastructure through improved networking and a fast and effective supply of information.

One of the main sections in the programme, with several excursions for participants, will focus on innovation in the Pays des Ecrins as the host of this year's AlpWeek (see the enclosed provisional programme).

COSALP - THE ORGANISING COMMITTEE FOR ALPWEEK

International Scientific Committee for Alpine Research (ISCAR)

ISCAR represents research organisations located in various countries of the Alps. It is one of the official observers of the Alpine Convention and supports the bodies of the Alpine Convention in an advisory capacity.

International Commission for the Protection of the Alps (CIPRA)

Founded in 1952, CIPRA is the international umbrella for seven national associations, one regional association and over a hundred member organisations active in the field of sustainable development.

Alliance in the Alps Network of Municipalities

Alliance in the Alps has now been operating for ten years as a network for municipalities in seven countries of the Alps. The Alpine Convention serves as a guideline for sustainable development and the basis of their work for the 250 municipalities now affiliated to the Alliance.

Alpine Network of Protected Areas (ALPARC)

The network comprises about a thousand large protected areas (more than 100 ha) created throughout the Alpine Arc for the protection of the flora and fauna and their biotopes, the promotion of sustainable development, visitor management and research. This network has now been working for twelve years on typical problems relating to big nature parks, nature conservation areas, biosphere reserves, quiet zones and other forms of protected area. Its activities are co-ordinated by the Protected Area Task Force at the Permanent Secretariat of the Alpine Convention.

Club Arc Alpin (CAA)

Club Arc Alpin is an international federation of all Alpine clubs. It is also an official observer of the Alpine Convention.

Knowledge sharing with regard to innovations that have already emerged and learning how to benefit from them, and working together to solve problems and build on the know-how that already exists in various places – those are the objectives of AlpWeek 2008, which will be held on 11 - 14 June 2008 for representatives of the scientific community, local authorities, NGOs and protected areas, as well as mountain sports enthusiasts and interested individuals from the eight countries of the Alps.

With its central location in Europe, the Alpine Arc will be one of the regions that will be affected most by the consequences of climate change in combination with the depletion of our reserves of fossil fuels. From trade and industry to biodiversity, from the landscapes to our ways of life, the impacts on the Alps will be significant. May local actors and representatives are now aware of the threat and see the importance of taking measures today to establish best practice solutions for tomorrow and shaping a future characterised by a better sense of equilibrium and consideration for the needs of future generations.

During the last century the Alps have been the scene of numerous inventions and achievements, which have shaped and changed the region. And today there are many men and women working in the framework of various initiatives from one end of the Alpine chain to the other to shape the future for and in the Alps.

It is fitting that this international event should take place in L'Argentière-la-Bessée. This small town in the Hautes-Alpes and the surrounding region of Pays des Ecrins have been working for some fifteen years on an innovative process of structural change with a twin focus on tourism and the natural environment and a commitment to sustainable development in partnership with the Les Ecrins National Park.

Based on the principles of the Alpine Convention, AlpWeek 2008 is a follow-up event to the first AlpWeek, which was held in Kranjska Gora in Slovenia in 2004. AlpWeek 2008 is being organised jointly by five pan-Alpine organisations: the International Scientific Committee for Alpine Research (ISCAR), the Alliance in the Alps Network of Municipalities, the Alpine Network of Protected Areas (ALPARC), the International Commission for the Protection of the Alps (CIPRA) and Club Arc Alpin. The conference is being held under the patronage of the French Minister of the Environment, Sustainable Development and Regional Planning and is an official event of the French presidency of the Alpine Convention.


